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
128th GERMAN DAY CELEBRATION

Time to save Over-the-Rhine

While Columbus has a German Village and Covington its Mainstrasse Village, Cincinnati has allowed it historic German district, Over-the-Rhine, to decline into an unsightly slum.

Although it may not be too late, it appears as if the 11th hour has been reached. Every year, more of its historic structures fall victim to the wrecking ball as, most recently, did the Burger Brewery, earlier Windisch-Muhlhauser, on Central Parkway, an excellent example of 19th century German-American brewery architecture.

The German-American architectural heritage is more clearly and strongly reflected in Overthe-Rhine than in any place in the city. Even its name connotes its origin. The Miami-Erie Canal.

a dubbed the "Rhine" in the 19th century, as when one crossed over it, one entered the German district.

A walking tour through the district reveals a treasure trove of German architectural heritage. At 11th and Elm, one finds the church of Cincinnati's first German congregation, Die Deutsche Sankt Johannes Protestantische Kirche, of course, with a German inscription, as is the case with so many Over-the-Rhine churches.

In Washington Park, there is a monument to Friederich Hecker (1811-81), the German revolutionary who came to the United States shortly after the 1848 revolution and helped establish the Turner Society here. During the Civil War, its members formed the 9th Ohio Regiment, commanded by Gen. August von Willich, whose home was at 1419 Main St. in Over-the-Rhine.

Brewery buildings still abound, such as Moerlein's, located on the

east side of Elm south of McMillan, and Hudepohl's, at 40 McMicken St. The sites of the old, still there, such as the Germania Beer Hall, 1313 Vine St., and Wielert's Beer Garden, 1408-10 Vine St.

Among the many German houses is that of the Kolping Society. 1523 Republic St., or Bremen St., as it was known before the anti-German hysteria of the World War I. The inscription there reads "Gott segne das ehrbare Handwerk" - "God bless the honorable Craft."

At the corner of 12th and Walnut, one finds the Germania Building of Heinrich A. Ratterman (1832-1923), the major German-American historian of his time. Down the street, there once stood the Turner Hall, which was torn down in the 1970s. It was known as "Ein' feste Burg" — "A mighty Fortress" — which housed a theater, library, bowling alley and meeting rooms, aside from its gymnastic facilities. It served as a community center.

Recently, parts of Over-the-

Rhine have shown a few glimmers of revitalization. Memorial Hall has been refurbished by the Cincinnati Preservation Association; Old St. Mary's has a preservation association, and the Main Street businesses have even sponsored a Bockbierfest. Also, Over-the-Rhine is the home of the Music Hall and Findlay Market.

These and other initiatives are worthy of support by the City of Cincinnati. Any planning of the central city (riverfront and business district) should also include Over-the-Rhine. Unfortunately, most plans seem to stop at the Rhine/Central Parkway. It does not make any sense to develop the central city and ignore the historic district adjacent to it. They should be viewed as a whole.

Across the river, the riverfront, business district and Mainstrasse Village have been attracting crowds and tourists. Drive down Interstate 75 and the signs refer you to Mainstrasse Village and the Oldenburg Brewery, not to Over-the-Rhine and its many architectural gems.

Perhaps they will someday, but only if the City of Cincinnati gets behind doing something about saving/salvaging what's left of its historic German district, Over-the-Rhine. Recent efforts by the city cracking down on building-code violations - are a step in the right direction. Let's hope such efforts are not too little and too



The Muhlhauser stained-glass window - This is located in the Philippus Church in Over-the-Rhine. The German inscription on it reads in translation as follows: "In Memory of Gottlieb

Muhlhauser, dedicated by his wife, Mrs. Christine B. Muhlhauser and son Eduard Muhlhauser." Gottlieb Muhlhauser along with his brother Heinrich and Conrad Windisch founded the Lion Brewery, or Löwen-Brauerei, in the West End.




MIAMI ERIE CANAL



Covington's West Side

The West Side of Covington, Kentucky – Covington is south of Cincinnati on the other side of the Ohio River, and both towns share much in common, unfortunately also including having I-75 cut right through them. John Boh has an article on Covington in the recent issue of the "Bulletin of the Kentucky County Historical Society," and comments about this. He writes: "The building of I-75 had a tremendously negative impact on the city's wellbeing. It separated Lewisburg and West Covington from the main city and brought other changes including depopulation." Homes and businesses were of course displaced. A former mayor, George Wermeling, is cited as describing the area as like "a very nice little German village." The construction of I-75 had the same devastating impact on the West End in Cincinnati.
